1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The curriculum delivery is communicated through hand book and calendar, college's official website , prospectus, morning assembly interactions and through displays in the notice board and at prominent places in the college campus. During the orientation and bridge programme the beginners are well instructed about the curriculum and it's delivery .Following are the measures taken for the effective implementation of the curriculum in the institution -annual plan, departmental plan, teaching plan, lesson plan, course plan, work diary ,log book, hand book and calendar. A fully functioning examination committee fixes the examination dates ,time table, duty assignments, consolidating mark lists and related activities. The college follows a continuous evaluation system and internal assessment comprising monthly tests, mid semester tests, model examination and progress card. The college follows a structured teaching plan. For every core subjects , optional subjects and electives faculty members are encouraged to develop smart measures to improve the quality of instruction. The college strictly follows the work load for the faculty members as per the UGC and N.C.T.E.norms. The curriculum of all programmes have been designed to provide a wholstic education ensuring the all round optimum development of the learner. As part of the intra mural programme student community is grouped into four houses and captain and vise captain are selected from each house for effective leadership. Programmes in literary, arts and sports and various competitions are arranged among these four different houses. For the effective transaction of the curriculum the college arranges field visits and internship programmes for students and organizes workshops and exhibitions..As part of EPC, students practice language and communication skills along with skills in computer and technology. Students of all departments undertake community oriented programmes and mini projects. Research workshops, seminars, group discussions, are regularly conducted for the students. A fully functional face book account also acts as laison with the external agencies. The college library and departments maintain their question banks . The weaker students get special attention with remedial and extra coaching classes through weekly mentoring. P.T.A.meeting are convened periodically for better transparency and understanding. The college has an active academic monitoring committee which earnestly works towards the betterment of the students. As the college is affiliated to the Kannur University, the process of revision and updating of the curriculum is always the responsibility of the affiliating university. The college follows a structured teaching plan. For every core subjects ,optional subjects and electives faculty members are encouraged to develop smart measures to improve the quality of instruction. Organizational academic and extension activities are implemented at departmental, interdepartmental and college level for deferent semesters, for the wholistic development of future are ensured during the training programme . The curriculum and syllabus is made available to students in the beginning itself. Along with the syllabus the activities for realizing the local and global objectives included in the co curricular activities. During the implementation stage, on the basis of the previous feedback obtained from the students, Alumni, parents, various stake holders corrective measures are introduced.

Feedback Obtained

Teaching ,learning and evaluation are the three major phases of education. Feed back and evaluation have significant effect on student learning and hence it is described as the single moderator that enhances achievement. It enables the teacher to find out to what extent he/she has been successful in their teaching and what they need to make their teaching more effective. Immediate feedback is provided to the student at the time of learning to improve understanding of the real pacing of thelearner soas to correct misconceptions and to develop

conceptual clarity in the class room. There are various clubs and various committees functioning along with the college union for the all round development of the learners. Each committee conducts a periodic evaluation and submits the report to the Principal. There is talent's day immediately after the beginning of the classes where by students are given opportunity to express their talents and skills and it gives enough feedback for students on their self confidence. In our college structured feedback is received from the following stake holders 1. Students, 2. Teachers 3. Alumni and 4. Parents and from 5. Practice Teaching Schools. 1. Feedback From students Each teacher is assessed by the student in a specific evaluation scale. They are given full freedom and to evaluate the teacher and give suggestions without any inhibition. This process of evaluation about the teacher is made at the end of each semester and finally at the end of the course. At the end of the course the students are given opportunity to asses the infrastructure facilities of the college in a manual form. 2. Feedback from teachers After each Mid-Semester and Model examinations appropriate feedback is given to the students by the concerned faculty. The faculty members share the examination result to the examination committee and the convenor of the examination committee gives an overall picture to the Principal. In the P.T.A. executive committee the Principal shares the results with them for a better understanding. While calculating the internal marks due weightage is given to the feed backs of student's attendance, performance in the tests, assignments ,tasks etc . 3.Alumni feedback Alumni feedback is collected every year in the Alumni Meet ,on second Saturday of January . Their suggestions were corporated in the smooth functioning of the College. They gave academic support to enhance the knowledge and skills of our student teachers. They lead many training programmes and personality development sessions organized by the College. 4. Feedback from parents The P.T.A includes all the faculty members and parents of all the students. It supports the various programmes and activities of the College. Periodic evaluation and comments are collected from the parents and considered them with due regard and respect. 5. Feedback from practice teaching schools. Internship is a compulsory part of the teacher education programme. All the admitted students are send to the Co-operating schools for their internship. They have to complete a minimum of 60 lesson plans for internship. So during this period their feedback is collected from the concerned schools

Mentoring in education involves pairing students with older volunteer, who acts as a positive role model. In general, mentoring aims to build confidence develop resilience and character, or raise aspirators, rather than to develop specific academic skills or knowledge. In our college we provide and maintain a good efficient mentoring system. In the academic year 2017-18 we had 98 students in both first year and second year batch. Each faculty mentored a total no. of 14 students in which 7 students were from first year seven students were from second year. Frequent meeting discussions were conducted between mentor mentees. In the meetings the mentor talk freely to the mentees inquired about the academic problems or issues they have given directions to solve it. Then the mentor personally conducted meetings with each students and enquired about their family background any issues they have etc. In the different sessions the mentor shared different view points, ideas, experiences etc. The mentees also shared their point of views, experiences etc. The mentor focused to build positive attitude and to practice positive thinking strategies among mentees to develop self confidence optimism.

According to this theory subjects have internal marks and it is 10 out of 60 marks theory paper 20 marks out of 80 marks theory paper 10 marks were distributed as 4 marks for attendance, 2 marks for test, 2 marks for assignment 2 marks for last . 20 marks were distributed as 4 marks for attendance, 6 marks for test 4 marks for assignment 6 marks for last. Criteria for distributing marks for attendance 4 marks for above 90 attendance, 3 marks for 85 - 90 attendance 2 marks for 80 - 85 attendance. ICT courses were allotted with an internal marks of 50 for each one . These marks were allotted based on pure clear criteria's . For EPC courses we conduct several workshops, activities etc. The incharge teacher observes the activities of each students values each student individually. We. also assess the participation of students in curricular cocurricular activities, extension in department college wise. After each programme we also conduct evaluation process. According to different criteria we are giving best outgoing student, Library utilization awards etc. to students.

He added that Yoga is above religion, above faith, above everything and urged people to make yoga a part of daily life. He said that let our motto be yoga for peace, harmony and progress. In order to promote Yoga as a part of education, the Union Government decided to introduce Yoga Education in Universities. For the same purpose, the government constituted a Committee on Yoga Education in Universities to identify the courses and programs in Yogic Arts and Science and the levels at which they can be offered. In order to promote Yoga as a part of school curriculum, Yoga Education was made compulsory by National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), a statutory body under

Ministry of Human Resource Development, through its 15 Teacher Education Programmes.NCTE developed modules on Yoga Education for Diploma in Elementary Education and master of Education. Over 15962 schools affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) were also asked to provide compulsory 40-45 minutes of Physical Activities such as Yoga to the students every day. 4. The Practice Yoga is considered to be the best practice of the college in the past three years. In the light of this initiatives from the part of the Government, the College inaugurated and introduced Yoga Classes as part of curriculum for the teacher education students in the college. There were several seminars and theory as well as practical classes conducted on the topic 'yoga'. The Yoga demonstration classes facilitated the students to learn Yoga in a systematic manner. Thus Yoga became an essential part of the college. Yoga is regularly practiced since then every day in the morning before the class commences and apart from that three hours a week was set apart in the timetable for Yoga practice. It became an active and important aspect of both curricular and cocurricular features of the college. In association with PKM Sports academy and Health and Physical FitnessClub, various postures of Yoga and types of Yoga were taught to the to the Teacher education students. Since the students of the college basically hail from the Hill stations of the district of Kannur and rural areas of Madampam, and the work load of the Teacher Education students is comparatively more they have no ample time to involve greatly in the physical activities. Lot of stress is seen in the life of these students as they face various problems of life. The students were found going through depression, fear, anxiety, and even low immunity power etc. This was the main reason for the college to focus on Yoga class and its practice. The result was that it brought a lot of confidence in them, they started facing challenges with courage and positive changes were seen in their behaviour pattern. The department identified the physically and psychologically weak students and provided them with special yoga training and that enhanced them to rebuild their mental and physical strength. 5. Hence the principalaims of teaching Yoga to the Teacher Education Students in the college are the following: - ? As they are the future teachers they could help the new generation students to handle stress. ? To help to overcome the emotional issues and find solutions to end their emotional problems. ? Once the Teacher Education students are taught yoga, they in turn can promote the same among the students they teach andthe children could easilyand regularly practice it at home. ? As most of the students in our college are women who come from faraway placesand hence have to leave home early and return home late, they find hardly any time for personal exercises at home. Hence the day in the college begins with breathing exercises followed by the other Yoga exercises in the Yoga hour allotted in the timetable. ? Several yoga courses are introduced to the students to update themselves in yoga practices. ? A good number of yoga experts were invited to the college by the Physical Education department to enlighten the students on Yoga and its practices. This definitely enable the students to develop their all-round personality. ? The goal of the department is to educate the teacher education students on Yoga and create Yoga experts to teach the students of the school they work. ? To equip them to practice and teach yoga after the two years of their studies to the children and adults of their locality. ? Teaching and nonteaching staff also participate in the yoga program and benefit out of it.
