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
FILM REVIEW **1983** (2014)

Do we really want the media coverage of women's cricket to be dominated by men? Don't we want women's cricket to be covered in its own right?


One of the major issues faced by women's cricket in India is the question of recognition and importance. It is not held at the same depth as the men's team. Well, the Indian women's national cricket team is yet to win any major international cricket trophy like the men's team that already has three world cups and a Champions Trophy in its kitty. One feels that a major win might spark some interest in the women's game. A big way to sustain it would be to start a league on the lines of IPL.India could follow their lead and get the top cricketers from around the world to play over here so that people can get interested. All this could get in the sponsors for the women's game as well and it could thrive as a result.

The first recorded match of women's cricket was reported in *The Reading Mercury* on 26 July 1745, a match contested "between eleven maids of Bramley and eleven maids of Hambledon, all dressed in white".

The first known women's cricket club was formed in 1887 in Yorkshire, named the White Heather Club. Three years later a team known as the Original English Lady Cricketers toured England, reportedly making substantial manager profits before their absconded with the money. Australia, a women's cricket league was set up in 1894, while in South Africa, Port Elizabeth had a women's cricket team, the Pioneers Cricket Club. In Canada, Victoria also had a women's cricket team that played at Beacon Hill Park.

In 1958 the International Women's Cricket Council (IWCC) was formed to co-ordinate women's cricket around the world, taking over from the English Women's Cricket Association, which had been doing the same job in a de facto role since its creation 32 years earlier. In 2005, the IWCC was merged with the International Cricket Council (ICC) to form one unified body to help manage and develop cricket. Women's cricket has been played internationally since the inaugural women's Test match between English women and Australian women in December 1934. New Zealand The following year, women joined them, and in 2007 Netherlands women became the tenth women's Test nation when they made debut against South Africa women. Since 1973, women's One Day Internationals (ODIs) have also been contested, and these quickly became the focus of women's international cricket. In the years since the inception of women's ODIs more than eight times more of this format has been played

than women's Test cricket. The Women's Cricket World Cup has been held nine times, with Australia, England and New Zealand sharing the titles.In 2004, a shorter format still was introduced, with the introduction of women's T20 International.





Initially, women's Twenty20 cricket was played little at international level, with only four matches played by the end of 2006. However, the following three years saw a rapid growth, with six matches been played in 2007, ten in 2008 and thirty in 2009, which also saw the first ICC Women's World Twenty20.

WORDPLAY CRICKET VOCABULARY



All out -- The batting team is said to be all out when ten of its eleven batsmen are dismissed. The eleventh batsman cannot continue without a partner, and is recorded as 'not out' in the scorebook.

All-rounder -player skilled at both batting and bowling.

Anchor - a top-order batsman capable of batting for a long duration throughout the innings.

Usually batsman playing at numbers

3 or 4 play such a role, especially if there is a batting collapse.

Approach - The motion of the bowler prior to bowling the ball. It is also known as the run-up.

Arm Ball - A ball bowled by a slow bowler which has no spin on it and so does not turn as expected but which stays on a straight line

Asking rate - The runs required per over for a team to win.

Attacking shot - A shot of aggression or strength designed to score runs.

Average, batting -- The total of a batsman's runs during the period for which the average is calculated, divided by the number of his completed innings, i.e. the number of times he was out in that period. An average of 40 is considered proficient, 50 outstanding.

Average, bowling - The total of runs scored off a bowler in the period to which the average refers, divided by the number of wickets he took.



Yuvraj Singh (born 12 December 1981) is a former Indian cricketer who played in all forms of the game. An all-rounder who bats left-handed in the middle order and bowls slow left-arm orthodox, Yuvraj is the son of former Indian fast bowler and Punjabi actor Yograj Singh. One of the greatest limited over players to play for India, Yuvraj was particularly noted for his hitting of the ball and his fielding.

YUVRAJ THE ROCKSTAR

Yuvraj was a member of the Indian cricket team in One Day Internationals (ODIs) between 2000 and 2017 and played his first Test match in October 2003. He was the vice-captain of the Indian ODI team between 2007 and 2008. He was the Man of the Tournament in the 2011 ICC Cricket World Cup, and one of the top performers at the 2007 ICC World Twenty20, both of which India won.

In the same match, he set the record for the fastest fifty in Twenty20 Internationals and in all Twenty20 cricket, reaching 50 runs in 12 balls. During the 2011 World Cup, he became the first player to take a 5-wicket haul and score a 50 in the same World Cup match.


In 2011, Yuvraj was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in his left lung and underwent chemotherapy treatment in Boston and Indianapolis. In March 2012, he was discharged from the hospital after completing the third and final cycle of chemotherapy and returned to India in April. He made his international comeback in a Twenty20 match in September against New Zealand shortly before the 2012 World Twenty20.

In 2012, Yuvraj was conferred with the Arjuna Award, India's second highest sporting award by the Government of India. In 2014, he was awarded the Padma Shri, India's fourth highest civilian honour. At the 2014 IPL auction Royal Challengers Bangalore bought

series. He won the Man of the Match award for his efforts. In the final ODI at Guwahati, Yuvraj made 75 runs from 52 balls, sharing a 157-run fifth-wicket partnership with Mongia who scored his career-best unbeaten 159, to help India post a total of 333 in their 50 overs. India went on to win the game by 101 runs and the series 3-2.

Ups and Downs

Despite his indifferent form leading to the World Cup, Yuvraj secured a place in the 15-man Indian squad for the 2003 ICC Cricket World Cup in South Africa. He scored 37 in against match India's opening Netherlands. In the following games, he had scores of 0, 1 and 7* against Namibia Zimbabwe and Australia, respectively. He scored a brisk 42 against England, followed unbeaten 50 against Pakistan setting up wins for India in both games. In the Super Six stage of the tournament, Yuvraj had scores of 58* against Kenya and 5 against Sri Lanka. He scored 16 in in the semi-final against Kenya, and 24 against Australia in the final.
